BLOOM SEQUENCE

Under normal conditions in the Washington area, bulbs flower in the following sequence:

February-March: Galanthus; Eranthis; Crocus species; Iris danfordiae and reticulata; Crocus hybrids.

March: Narcissus species; Scilla sibirica; Chionodoxa; Tulip Kaufmanniana, Fosteriana, early Botanicals; Muscari armeniacum and botryoides; Tulip Greigii, other Botanicals.

April: Narcissus Trumpets, Long-cupped; Tulip Single Early, Double Early; Narcissus Short-cupped; Anemone blanda; Tulip Triumph, Darwin hybrid; Narcissus Doubles, Jonquilla, Poeticus; Tulip Single Late, Lily-flowered, Fringed, Parrot, Double Late; Muscari botryoides.

May: Early Alliums; Dutch Iris; Leucojum aestivum; Muscari comosum; Puschkinia; Erythronium; Oxalis; Dichelostemma

CLASSIFICATION OF NARCISSUS					
<p>The Dutch, for all their bulb pre-eminence and their network of 1,000 daffodil growers, rank second to the British in narcissus production. We follow the nomenclature established by the Royal Horticultural Society of Britain and modified by the RHS and the American Daffodil Society in 1998. Of the 13 divisions, the tenth was newly added to incorporate the Hoop Petticoat daffodils; the 11th was split into two parts; the 13th now includes all botanicals. The system color codes all daffodils: W, white or whitish; G, green; Y, yellow; P, pink; O, orange; R, red. These letters appear after cultivar names— the first letter describes the perianth (petals and sepals) and the second and any other letters the cup or corona. The words narcissus and daffodil are synonymous. The letters 'GM' indicate an American-bred bulb, introduced by the late Grant Mitsch of Oregon. It's worth noting that narcissus are deer resistant.</p>

DEADHEADING AND SELF-SEEDING

Here's some advice from Bob Polomski, horticulturalist at Clemson University: Deadheading tulips diverts them from seed production to storing energy for next year. However, certain species tulips, such as *T. clusiana*, will produce volunteer seedlings if they are not deadheaded. It's not necessary to deadhead hybrid narcissus because they usually do not produce seed. Many species daffodils do produce viable seeds, including *N. bulbocodium* and *N. poeticus* var. *recurvus*. Other bulbs that will reseed themselves include *Anemone blanda*, *Chionodoxa* spp., *Eranthis hiemalis*, *Galanthus* spp., *Leucojum vernum*, *Muscari* spp., *Puschkinia libanotica*, and *Scilla siberica*.
